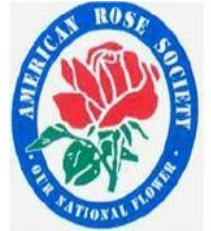

Rambling Rosarian

It seems like we are always talking about the weather conditions and the difficulties it generates in growing roses. This year is not different. We have had an over-abundance of rain in some areas and the conditions in my area are getting a little dry. Just 9 miles away there has been more rain. Then there has been the heat. The temperatures were in the 90s for over a week and in the 70s at night.

Learning to cope with ever-changing weather conditions is what we must accomplish to grow good roses. Watering has not been a priority with the abundance of rain. Even with all the rain I have had very little problem with blackspot or downy mildew. I have been doing regular spraying when the weather permits.

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I have always heard if you can get the spray to lay on the foliage for an hour it has done its job.

A stepped-up feeding program has provided good results. I am always looking for ways to grow better roses with less expense and ease of work. There are as many feeding programs as there are rosarians and no one can say one is better than the other. It is a matter of finding something that works for you and your growing conditions. You have read many times about my liquid feeding barrel and I keep adding to my formula and getting better results.

There are many organic items you may use in the liquid feed or “tea” barrel. My barrel is a 65-gallon capacity. I filled it with water and added in the ingredients to make the tea. I started out with Jobe’s Organic Plant Food which worked very well. Later I added in fish emulsion and this gave it a little more kick. This year I had some fish in the freezer we caught at Nag’s Head a few years ago which we were not going to eat. I ground them up and in the barrel they went. At this point my recipe was achieving a quite pungent odor.



Now, if this wasn’t enough, I went to the Farm Bureau and purchased a bag of alfalfa meal. This has kicked the fragrance way up! I apply 16 ounces of this tea to each rose plant twice a week. I also add in one tablespoon of Miracle-Gro per gallon. Every two weeks on one feeding I also add in one tablespoon of Epsom salts. After each feeding I will refill the barrel with water and add a 16-ounce cup of alfalfa meal. Once per month I add in a bag of the Jobe’s Organic Plant Food and a quart bottle of fish emulsion.

I have the best roses I have grown in years! My foliage looks like it has been waxed. I am getting longer canes and better blooms. It is amazing how something which smells so bad can grow something that smells so good.

This has greatly reduced my cost of feeding my roses. A 40-pound bag of alfalfa meal costs \$19, the Jobe’s is \$4.95, the quart of fish emulsion \$8.95, and the barrel was FREE! You can see it is costing me less than \$20 per month to feed 150 roses. It takes 15 gallons of the tea for one feeding, so the mixture gets more potent with each feeding. I leave the barrel up all winter and it is ready to go first thing in the spring.

As with any feeding program, you need to keep a watch on your pH. If you don’t have rain, watering is still a must. With the feeding program the roses are getting a quart of liquid per week which is concentrated food with a lot of bacteria. The bacteria is needed to break down nutrients in the soil which can be taken up by the plant. The alfalfa tea provided many minerals and vitamins the plants need along with a growth hormone which helps the plants produce new canes, shiny foliage, and better flowers. When I added the alfalfa meal, I could tell the difference within a week.

Develop a program which works for you and fits your conditions. A good feeding program will reward you with beautiful roses. The barrel like I am using is great if you can get around the smell.
