


Shenandoah Rose Ramblings

The Rambling Rosarian

Rain, Rain go away. Come again another day. Preferably July and August. I have not been able to do the work in my roses I want to do because of so much rain. I have registered 5 inches in 8 days. We are getting a couple of days break in the rain so maybe I can get some rose work done and mow my lawn hay.

My roses are starting to bloom in late May. I have noticed just a few aphids but the lady bugs seem to be taking care of them. I noticed one of the roses I got in Jacksonville has just a little Downy Mildew on it. Not serious but just a minor case which I can control with spray. Considering is such a minor case I may just cut that out of the bush.



Don't confuse black spot and downy mildew. The two may look similar to the untrained eye but are easy to detect the difference. Black spot starts at the bottom of the plant and works its way up where downy mildew starts at the top of the plant and works its way down. Also, the downy mildew circles will cross the center vein of the leaf where



black spot will not.

With all the rain, weed control is a problem. Many times I will use the old organic method called "Grab and Pull". In the rose beds and up close to the roses this may be the only way. Other than that I like to use Round Up. The patent went off Round Up a few years ago and there are generic versions of it out which I use. They are the exact same chemical and cost a lot less. They work just the same. There is a new version of Round Up out which I believe is a granular which you put on the ground and it is supposed to keep killing for most of the season. I have seen one warning about using this product. Seems it will leach out through the ground and kill items like your roses ten to twenty feet from where you put it down. Use caution with this product.

I noticed I am going to have to start my spray program. I have seen a few leaves with chew marks in them. With all the rain spraying has been impossible. Odd as it may seem, I have not detected any fungal problems. A few aphids but the lady bugs seem to be keeping them under control. Deer made a visit to my roses. They hit about a dozen bushes in the lower end of the garden. I guess they were getting back at me for putting the electric fence around my vegetable garden.



There is always something new and different. I was walking across my front lawn and had to stop for a double take. There was a wild turkey in my front yard. It didn't seem at all scared of me and I walked up within five feet of it. I guess by the looks it would go 30 to 35 pounds. Now I have deer, turkey, rabbits, squirrels, skunks, ground hogs, foxes, possums and coyotes. They only thing missing is a bear.

Coming Attraction

Yes, we have that coming attraction that hits us every year about mid June. That dreaded Japanese Beetle will be making it's yearly visit. The beetles were extremely heavy last year. In working my vegetable garden and in planting new roses, I have seen many grubs which indicates the beetles will be heavy again this year.

If you use the beetle traps make sure they are a good distance from what you want to protect. The way the traps work is to lure the beetles to them. You want to draw them away from what you are protecting. There are several sprays on the market that are recommended for the Japanese Beetle but it seems you have to spray ever second or third day to control them. When you spray the growth that is there is protected but that new growth two days from now is not.



About 10 or 12 years ago I put down the Milky Spore and it did what it was supposed to do. For several years I had very few beetles and then the Milky Spore wore off. I reapplied it last year but it takes three years for it to reach full potential.

Hand picking will work if you don't mind spending a good part of your day picking beetles. You would have to do this three or four times a day.

I recently came across an article that said making a spray from the Eastern Red Cedar will repel the beetles. This I am anxious to try. It has to be the Eastern aromatic cedar. I have plenty of it growing around my area. You can also purchase the cedar boards. You soak the cedar wood in water for 24 hours to make a spray. Spray your roses with this and it is supposed to repel the beetles.

The Japanese Beetles are a problem but there are ways to control them. I sometimes wonder what the next plague will be to hit our roses.
